WE HEAR GOD'S WORD

FIRST LESSON: Romans 6:3-11

Or don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will

certainly also be united with him in a resurrection like his. For we know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body ruled by sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin— because anyone who has died has been set free from sin.

Now if we died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. For we know that since Christ was raised from the dead, he cannot die again; death no longer has mastery over him. ¹⁰ The death he died, he died to sin once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. In the same way, count yourselves dead to sin but alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Psalm 1

Blessed is the one

who does not walk in step with the wicked or stand in the way that sinners take or sit in the company of mockers,

- ² but whose delight is in the law of the LORD, and who meditates on his law day and night.
- ³ That person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither—

whatever they do prospers. ⁴ Not so the wicked!

They are like chaff that the wind blows away.

- ⁵Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the assembly of the righteous.
- ⁶ For the LORD watches over the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked leads to destruction.

THE GOSPEL: Mark 2:13-22

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Once again Jesus went out beside the lake. A large crowd came to him, and he began to teach them. As he walked along, he saw Levi son of Alphaeus sitting at the tax collector's booth. "Follow me," Jesus told him, and Levi got up and followed him.

While Jesus was having dinner at Levi's house, many tax collectors and sinners were eating with him and his disciples, for there were many who followed him. When the teachers of the law who were Pharisees saw him eating with the sinners and tax collectors, they asked his disciples: "Why does he eat with tax collectors and sinners?"

On hearing this, Jesus said to them, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners."

Now John's disciples and the Pharisees were fasting. Some people came and asked Jesus, "How is it that John's disciples and the disciples of the Pharisees are fasting, but yours are not?"

Jesus answered, "How can the guests of the bridegroom fast while he is with them? They cannot, so long as they have him with them. But the time will come when the bridegroom will be taken from them, and on that day they will fast.

"No one sews a patch of unshrunk cloth on an old garment. Otherwise, the new piece will pull away from the old, making the tear worse. And no one pours new wine into old wineskins. Otherwise, the wine will burst the skins, and both the wine and the wineskins will be ruined. No, they pour new wine into new wineskins."

THE NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.


Celebrant The Lord be with you.

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. AMEN.

And now as our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses,

as we forgive those who trespass against us. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Suggested Spiritual Practice for the Fall: A Colloquy

In the 16th century, St. Ignatius of Loyola taught his students a form of prayer that he referred to as a colloquy (or "conversation"). His intention in teaching this approach to prayer was to encourage his students to embrace prayer as a conversation. Prayer does not require us to use the language of the Prayer Book or any formal language; rather, prayer at its heart is a simple conversation with God. A colloquy utilizes our imagination as a resource for prayer.

To use this form of prayer:

- 1. Place your body in a comfortable position, close your eyes, and begin to relax your body and quiet your thoughts. If it is helpful, slowly repeat a word such as "peace" to calm your thoughts.
- 2. Invite the Holy Spirit to guide your time of prayer.
- 3. Imagine that you are seated in a familiar place where you would normally talk with a friend, such as your living room, kitchen table, porch, etc.
- 4. Imagine Jesus joins you in that familiar place and sits with you.
- 5. While you are imagining Jesus is sitting with you, share with Jesus what is on your heart and in your mind, and imagine that Jesus is looking at you attentively and with love. It is also appropriate to imagine you are sitting with Jesus in silence.
- 6. When you are ready to bring your prayer to an end, thank Jesus for joining you in your time of prayer.
